HAWAII MERCI BOXCAR COMING BACK RESTORATIONS MOVING ALONG IN AZ AND OK

Restoration of the Hawaii Merci Boxcar is a project that has been in the works for several years. Now the 49th car of the Gratitude Train is getting a little closer to completion. Originally given to Washington DC and the territory of Hawaii as there were only 48 states in 1949 - the boxcar itself ended up in Hawaii. Some of our treasured boxcars have been lost forever, but this gift of Good Will and Gratitude is well on the way to a full restoration.

This effort really started when friends of www.mercitrain.org held a small ceremony on December 8, 2013, in honor of Earl Bennett, who was the founder of mercitrain.org. The Hawaii car completed Earl's quest to visit all the remaining 43 Merci Train boxcars. His dream was to see the Hawaii car restored. Generous contributions were made then to start the project and have been held by the Hawaiian Railway Society in a restricted fund.

Along with other projects and priorities, Glen Houlton, Director of Restoration, Hawaiian Railway Society, has been working to keep the project moving. Help and support has also come from Jane Morrow Mann, Daughters of the American Revolution, who became interested in this project several years ago. She assisted in the coordination to repair the metal framework and other projects relating to the initial prep work for the restoration. In June 2019, Jane Morrow Mann was installed as State Regent of the Hawaii State Society Daughters of the American Revolution and identified this project as the primary service project to be undertaken by the DAR during her term of office which will end in June 2022.

This endeavor has moved along now with replacement lumber ordered just prior to the COVID shutdown in March of 2020. The above photo shows the new lumber that was specially milled to duplicate the original boards used to build the car. A major restoration such as this is much more complicated than just replacing shields. A lot of research, planning and coordination of time and labor is needed for this to be done correctly. Add in the many other obligations of the Hawaiian Railway Society and it all takes its own share of valuable time and resources. Progress will continue and replacement Coat of Arms shields are in production to be ready for the Hawaii Merci Boxcar when the time comes. We are grateful this project is in the works and eagerly look forward to that day when it is completed.

BOXCAR RESTORATION GUIDE AVAILABLE (Avoid Common Restoration Errors)

2024 is the 75th Anniversary of the Gratitude Train! Does your state's boxcar need an update?

<u>WWW.MERCITRAIN.ORG</u> has been working to promote accurate updates and restoration work to the 43 remaining Merci Boxcars which were a part of the French Gratitude Train. Over the years much of the details of the original boxcars has been lost and many boxcars look far different than they did when received in 1949. Many states have done updates but little guidance has been available for these updates.

To solve this problem volunteer researchers associated with mercitrain.org spent many hours to identify specific details associated with the Merci Boxcars given to each state in 1949. Their goal has been to provide a central location for detailed information and provide guidance as to the design, color and placement of shields and other adornments to the remaining boxcars. As a result, a restoration guide has been produced and posted on the www.mercitrain.org website. Those interested can download the Merci Boxcar Adornment and Marking Restoration Guide.

Heritage Printing in North Carolina is working with mercitrain.org to provide reproduction shields and other adornments and a price list is posted on the www.mercitrain.org website. Groups in charge of their state's boxcar may choose your own vendor, but the high resolution vector files are restricted to use by Heritage Printing only. In any event, the guide should provide information about placement of shields and other details that have not been readily available until now.



Vice Presidential History

Alben William Barkley (November 24, 1877 – April 30, 1956) was an American lawyer and politician from Kentucky who served in both houses of Congress and as the 35th vice president of the United States from 1949 to 1953. In 1905, he was elected county attorney for McCracken County, Kentucky. He was chosen County Judge/ Executive in 1909 and U.S. representative from Kentucky's First District in 1912. As a Representative, he was a lib-Democrat, supporting eral President Woodrow Wilson's New Freedom domestic agenda and foreign poli-

Endorsing Prohibition and denouncing parimutuel betting, Barkley narrowly lost the 1923 Democratic gubernatorial primary to fellow Representative J. Campbell Cantrill. In 1926, he unseated Republican Senator Richard P. Ernst. In the Senate, he supported the New Deal approach to addressing the Great Depression and was elected to succeed Senate Majority Leader Joseph T. Robinson upon Robinson's death in 1937. During his 1938 re-election bid, his opponent, A. B. "Happy" Chandler, accused him of using Works Progress Administration employees to campaign



for him; Barkley claimed Chandler used state employees in the same way. Neither candidate was charged with any wrongdoing, but in 1939, Congress passed the Hatch Act, making it illegal for federal employees to campaign for political candidates.

When World War II focused President Franklin D. Roosevelt's attention on foreign affairs, Barkley gained influence over the administration's domestic agenda. He resigned as floor leader after Roosevelt ignored his advice and vetoed the Revenue

Act of 1943. The veto was overridden and the Democratic caucus supported and unanimously re-elected Barkley to the position of Majority Leader. Barkley had a good working relationship with Harry S. Truman, who ascended to the presidency after Roosevelt's death in 1945. With Truman's popularity waning entering the 1948 Democratic National Convention, Barkley gave a keynote address that energized the delegates. Truman selected him as his running mate for the upcoming election and the Democratic ticket scored an upset victory. Barkley took an active role in the Truman administration, acting as its primary spokesman, especially after the Korean War necessitated the majority of Truman's attention. When Truman announced that he would not seek reelection in 1952, Barkley began organizing a presidential campaign, but labor leaders refused to endorse his candidacy because of his age, and he withdrew from the race. He retired but was coaxed back into public life, defeating incumbent Republican Senator John Sherman Cooper in 1954. Barkley died of a heart attack during a speech at the Washington and Lee Mock Convention on April 30, 1956.
