I will grant you that this virus has had all of our veteran posts closed down for months on end and with no place to meet or put on any functions, makes it almost an impossibility. But to be honest, we have been experiencing a 5% decline in membership every year for a decade or more, so this problem goes back a lot farther than just this last year. Besides I don't believe a Forty and Eighter would quit the organization after just one year of inactivity. We need to bring the pride back in this organization. Quite frankly this can't be done at the National level, or the Grande level for that matter, it has to be done at the Locale level. That's where the rubber meets the road and things get done. Do it and they will come!

Another issue that was stated in the briefs that I believe needs a little more exposure is the resignation of Passe Chef de Chem de Fer Paul Sorrentino from the finance committee this month (July). Having served on this committee I know the work and commitment that is required to do this job. I want to thank him for all of his service, not only on this committee, but to La Société as a whole. I'm sure we'll see him around if only because of all the Forty and Eight blue running through his veins, but his work will be missed. To fill his position, I have asked Joe Dolwig to assume the duties of this job. Joe is from the Grande du Ohio and I have all the confidence in his abilities.

In closing, I know this pandemic has rewritten the rule book on many things. We, as an organization, need to adapt to this new way of life. I also know that for a lot of our members (including me) adapting to new ways is not the easiest thing to accomplish. I know it can be done; I know it has to be done to survive. Our membership are survivors, not only in the service of our country but in life itself. They can get the job done, just ask them to help. 


AMERICANISM RECIPIENT

It is with great honor and humility that I nominate Laurence Rosen, MD for the prestigious La Societe de Quarante et Hommes et Huit Chevaux American-

I have known Dr. Rosen for many years. He is the epitome of a Patriot, Soldier, Physician and Humanitarian. Throughout his career, he has eschewed outside recognition for his accomplishments. He was, is and will always be a person of the people. He is not pretentious, nor arrogant, nor self-assuming. He is one of us.

Dr. Rosen's curriculum is substantive. He is a highly qualified physician, airframe and power plant airplane mechanic and environmental science professional. He



His humanitarian work in the medical clinics in the rural parts of Mexico and Latin/Central America has brought quality medical care to those who, either by geography or lack of finances, would not have received any care. His dedication to knowledge and education was paramount with his working with children and learning difficulties.

From 1987 to 1991, he was part of a volunteer medical mission to Honduras. As the anesthesiologist, he provided anesthesia to the young children who were being operated on to surgically repair their cleft palates.

From 1993 to 1995, Dr. Rosen was the sponsor for Mama Paulita, in Cuidad Limon, Tamaulipas, Mexico. He personally provided financial assistance in support of the children from ages 4 to 16 in the orphanage. Additionally, Dr. Rosen helped to coordinate the medical supplies donated by the Methodist Hospital and Santa Rosa Children's Hospital located in San Antonio, Texas.

In 1994, Dr. Rosen helped in the building of a small Catholic Church in cooperation with Domitila Virrueta de Martinez. During hurricane season, it serves as a shelter for the local population. The project was started by the local "Medicine Woman" - midwife of the village of Ejido Adolfo Lopez Mateos, Baja California Region, Mexico. But funding eventually ran out before the project was finished. Dr. Rosen, seeing the worthwhile aspects of the construction, personally funded the rest of the project to completion. The goal was to; in addition, use the church as a nurse's station where health could be obtained.

From 2011 to 2018, Dr. Rosen was a volunteer reader for children at Scenic Hills SDA Christian School, Bandera Road, San Antonio, Texas. Dr. Rosen taught and read to children for approximately one hour each Friday for the school year. Most importantly, he was the adult that listened to children with learning difficulties read. These children struggles to read and were embarrassed to read to others in class. So they would read to Dr. Rosen who was very patient and helped with their reading.

But perhaps his greatest actions took place fifty years ago when he volunteered for a mission that would change the lives of all involved; and continue the Gift for Life of twenty six - 26 individuals whose lives were ebbing away. These 26 survived, lived and begat future generations. Generations that would not exist if it were not for the valor and heroism of First Lieutenant Laurence Rosen. How do I know? I was invited to a reunion od the survivors of the Fire Support Base Ripcord. They were members of the 1st Battalion, 506th Infantry Brigade, 101st Airborne Division. They were the ones who thanked him. For without Lieutenant Rosen's actions, they would have died in the jungle, on that fire support base, and forgotten by most except for those who were

As written in Vietnam Magazine, February 2005; the book Hell On A Hill Top. By MG Benjamin L. Harrison, pages 98-99 - a past recipient of our Americanism Award; and eye witness accounts.

These are just a few indications of Dr. Rosen's lifetime of caring and sacrificing for others. These actions are what makes Lawrence Rosen, M. D. a Patriot, Soldier, Physician and Humanitarian, He is truly worthy to be recognized by our organization's highest award - The Americanism Award. Respectfully Submitted



- Admiral James B. Stockdale Award: Awarded to the Grand Voiture that consists of 651 or more Voyagers that contributes \$2,500 or more in one year
- H. Okay Parker Award: Awarded to the Grand Voiture that consists of 650 or less Voyagers that contributes \$1,000 or more in one year.
- Mchael J. Salome Award: Awarded to the Voiture Locale that consist of 31 or more Voyagers that contributes \$1,000 or more in one year.
- Richard "Rick" Brewer Award: Awarded to the Voiture Locale that consists of 30 or less Voyagers that contributes \$750 or more in one year.
- POW/MIIA Voyager Militaire of the Year: Awarded to the individual for OUTSTANDING contributions to the POW/MIA Program.

In order to recognize any of these Grandes, Voiture's, or individuals, it is most important to submit your Annual Consolidated Report in a timely manner. Ensure that individual Voiture's and individuals are identified on your report.

Even in this time of social distancing, the 40/8 is willing to step up and help people have a Happy Day!





MILBURN HENKE 1918-1998 Pvt. Milburn Henke, a Hutchinson, Minn., native selected from among the first U.S. troops sent to the British Isles in World War II, stepped down the gangplank from his transport to be the first soldier ashore in Belfast, Northern Ireland, on Jan. 26, 1942.

The British troopship, a converted luxury liner, slipped secretly out of the Manhattan darkness. It was January 1942, just a month after Pearl Harbor, and Milburn Henke, a 23-year-old cafe owner's kid from Hutchinson, Minn., was among 4,000 American soldiers with the 34th Red Bull Infantry Division.

When the ship docked in Belfast, Henke wasn't sure where he was but figured Ireland. Waiting to disembark, he was sitting around "doing nothing when the colonel came around looking awfully busy and bothered." The colonel asked Lt. Springer for a man. Henke didn't think much about it when he was told to go with the colonel.

"When I was picked, I thought: Oh no, another dirty detail," Henke later recalled, figuring he'd been tapped to unload cargo.

Instead, Henke walked 11 steps down a gangplank and into history's footnotes — becoming in that moment the first American combat GI to set foot on European soil in World War II. The 75th anniversary of Victory in Europe Day on May 8 makes it fitting to remember him now.

"The fact that I was just sort of picked out of the hat doesn't change the memories," he said in 1971.

The Royal Ulster Rifles band played "The Star-Spangled Banner" and the crowd roared as Henke took those ceremonial steps. So many cameras greeted him that he needed to restage his walk multiple times until photographers had enough angles to stoke patriotic fervor.

"I never tried to downgrade what it meant," he said. "I mean the symbol of America sending its boys to Europe to help win the war."

On Henke's way down the gangplank and into history, Maj. Gen. Russell Hartle asked him if he could talk to the waiting radio and newspaper reporters. Henke shrugged: "Well, if I have to."

In the process, he carved another notch in the history of the Minnesota-lowa rivalry. "When I said I was from Minnesota, a whole bunch of army mouths fell open," Henke said in 1956. "Our outfit was mostly from lowa, and I think it was taken for granted 'the first' would be from lowa."

After saluting U.S. troop commander Maj. Gen. James Chaney, the Hutchinson kid asked: "When do we get a whack at those Germans?"

Henke told reporters of his one regret: He'd left his girlfriend, Lola Christensen, back in Minnesota. "I don't know if she will wait for me," he said. "She may be stepping out on me now, but I hope not."

Not to worry. Milburn and Lola married in 1944, raised three children and were married for 53 years. After the war he operated Henke's Hamburger Shop near a highway filling station in Hutchinson. He wasn't far from the McLeod County farm where he was born in 1918, during the First World War. He died at 79 in 1998 from pancreatic cancer.

"He was proud," Lola said when he died, "but he always said it wasn't just him. He represented all the American soldiers."

The spotlight brought him meetings with Queen Elizabeth and Eleanor Roosevelt, not to mention 1,000 letters from all 50 states, England and South America. "I had a barracks bag full, my parents had two," he said.

Lola said some of the letters to her came from women who wrote to say they never regretted waiting for their World War I soldiers. She said that one soldier wrote her to say "he'd personally pin my ears back" if he heard she'd stepped out on Henke.

During the fighting in North Africa, Sgt. Henke crawled under heavy fire and pulled wounded Lt. Springer to safety, earning a Silver Star. But by the time victory in Europe was secured on May 8, 1945, Henke was out of the limelight. He had fractured his back in a jeep accident before the invasion of Italy, spending four months in the hospital before a brief return to duty and then a ship ride home with less fanfare than what had greeted his arrival.

"For a while there with all the attention I got, it looked as though the Army's plan was for me to win the war single-handed," he told Minneapolis Star columnist Jim Klobuchar in 1971, while pouring coffee at his Hutchinson cafe.

His father had run a diner since 1930 and couldn't afford to send Milburn to college. "I vowed I'd hock my shoes if I had to, to be sure my kids had the chance," he said. All three kids went to college.

Henke returned to Belfast in 1967 on the 25th anniversary of his historic gangplank walk. "They sure didn't have trouble getting me over the first time. But this time. I wasn't so sure." he said.

His passport application took longer than expected, delaying the trip. And the airline ticket provided him by a Belfast TV station had him leaving from Kansas City. He guessed that someone had mixed up Hutchinson, Kan., and his hometown in Minnesota. "They thought I could take a taxi to the Kansas City airport," he joked in 1967.

Henke's uniform is part of the Minnesota Military Museum at Camp Ripley, Little Falls, Minnesota ,where director Randal Dietrich said it's important to remember the Hutchinson soldier on this anniversary. Even amid the coronavirus crisis, Dietrich said, "Some things should not be overshadowed."

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Special Awards 2020

With all of the problems that have developed since the virus came upon us, Special Awards continued on without a hitch. Again this year we had nominations in all four categories of awards. However, even though the Nationale Promenade has been cancelled this year for the safety of all involved, the awards will still be made and are as follows.



City/Town of the Year

The City/Town of the year was nominated by Voiture 576 of Grand du South Carolina and the winner is Bishopville, SC.

Initially, when South Carolina received their Mercy Car, it was placed at the American Legion Post in Columbia, SC. However, due to the combining of a couple of Voiture's, it was decided that the Mercy Car needed a new home. The Military Museum and the Cotton Museum in Bishopville accepted the challenge and had the car moved to The American Legion Post in Bishopville. After the completion of the move, on November 11th, 2018 at 11 am, all the town bells chimed 11 times and that was the beginning of the dedication Ceremony with Voyageurs and Dames from Grand du SC along with local residents in attendance. Bishopville Memorial Park of Bishopville, SC, was rededicated to send a clear message that we, the citizens of Lee County, not only remembered, but also desire that future generations remember that wars that ended a long time ago and wars that continue today. But most of all, it tells us of American patriots, Americans who responded in defense of freedom, at times at a cost too great to fathom.

Hero of the Year

This nomination for the Hero of the Year award was received from Voiture 1450, Grand du California. The nomination for Hero of the Year was for Officer Youssef Brady, Los Angeles Police Department who responded to a robbery call at Sunset Blvd and Highland Ave in the Hollywood Division of the LAPD.

The call for police assistance started when the suspect, armed with a knife, was robbing an auto parts store located at the junction of the two streets. The suspect upon leaving the store tried to make his escape by high jacking a car in the drive through of a fast food business. In his attempt to leave, he was confronted by police vehicles responding to the call. A vehicular crash resulted and the suspect was forced to abandon his vehicle with officers in foot pursuit. At the time the suspect abandoned the vehicle, officers observed the suspect armed with a machete. The foot pursuit continued for a considerable distance with him failing to respond to officer's commands. The pursuit was being filmed by an officer's camera.

At a point, the suspect stopped and turned towards the pursuing officer. The suspect then started to advance on the officer forcing the officer to try and back away from him. While trying to back away from the suspect, the officer lost his balance and fell onto the street.

As Officer Brady arrived at the location, he observed the suspect advancing towards the down officer and raising the machete in what appeared to be an attack on the officer. Officer Brady in attempting to save the down officer fired his service weapon at the suspect stopping the assault from happening and saving the downed officer.

Officer Brady was 25 years old at the time and had only been a member of the LAPD for four and one-half years. Our congratulations go out to Officer Brady.

Law Enforcement Officer of the Year

The Law Enforcement Officer of the Year award nomination was submitted by Voiture 1321 of Grand du Missouri.

The award goes to Lieutenant Brian Taylor of the Jefferson County Sheriff's Office of Imperial, MO.

Lt. Taylor began his law enforcement in the City of Desoto where he started in the patrol division before being assigned to the Jefferson County Municipal Enforcement Group as a narcotics investigator. This part of his career was focused on narcotics detection with an emphasis on meth lab enforcement. He assisted with training on meth lab detection to the public and emergency services to increase public awareness and safety.

Brian also taught how individuals should report criminal activity to law enforcement. Brian was later transferred to the detective bureau where he handled both misdemeanor and felony crimes. He was subsequently assigned to the Major Case Squad of the Greater St. Louis area as an Investigator, where he was promoted to Sgt, and Patrol Supervisor until he left the City of Desoto.

In 2008, Brian came to work for the Jefferson County Sheriff's Office as a Road Patrol deputy. He was quickly transferred to the Detective Bureau

assigned to the Major Case Squad of Greater St. Louis as an Investigator and was recently moved to the unit as a Deputy Report Writer. During his time in the Detective Bureau, he handled felony crime investigations with an emphasis on violent crimes. He was instrumental in obtaining numerous confessions on high profile crimes, which often resulted in the prosecution of the offender. It was during this time that Brian was also assigned to the Jefferson County S.W.A.T. Unit as a Crisis Negotiator where he remained for the next several years. He was next moved to the Special Operation Division as a DWI Enforcement Officer, where he excelled in the area of impaired drinking detection and the removal of those dangerous individuals from the roadway. After being promoted to the rank of Corporal, he was transferred back to Road patrol as a first line supervisor in charge of his own squad. Shortly thereafter, he was transferred back into the Special Operation Division as a Supervisor where he oversaw the Traffic Division and the DWI Enforcement Unit.

Lt. Taylor has received numerous letters of commendation throughout his career and received the Governor's Medal of Valor and Jefferson County Life Saving Award in 2015 for pulling an elderly driver from his burning vehicle.

As stated in his nomination, during Brian's twenty years in law enforcement, he has proven himself to be a valued member of the Jefferson County Sheriff's Office and the County of Jefferson. His loyalty to his family, his agency and community have exemplified why he should be considered as an outstanding candidate for this award. Congratulations Lt. Taylor


Voyageur of the Year

The pin design was inspired by National Officers of La Societé and La Femmes, present and passé. During their visit to the Carville museum, they learned about a special wheelchair exhibited at the museum and the amazing woman to whom it belonged.

The pin's photograph depicts Zella Brown who lost her legs to Hansen's disease yet was able to navigate the miles of corridors that linked the buildings of Carville - thanks to her specially modified wheelchair.

Zella's wheelchair has padded handles for each hand that are cranked like pedals of a bicycle to move the chair. (Each handle is connected by chain to an axle sprocket on a wheel.) Hers was not the only such chair used by patients to avoid hand contact with wheels and spokes, a source of frequent injury to the numb hands of many patients with Hansen's disease.

Mr. Anthony Sanchez a current employee of the National Hansen's Disease Program recalls that Zella would call upon him to make necessary repairs to her wheelchair. He remembers that Zella refused offers of a new battery-powered wheelchair, preferring hers instead.



Zella Brown was born in Abita Springs, Louisiana on May 12, 1914. She was sent to Carville at the age of 12. Zella was noted to be "an institution at Carville, endearing herself to staff, patients, and visitors. She had a habit of going to bed early and waking up at 3 A.M. to take her bath. When country and western singers came to perform for patients, Zella would always ask for her favorite selection, "Your Cheating Heart"."

Photographers that visited Carville would find that permission to photograph Zella was granted only upon meeting her conditions. Zella's photograph on our pin is gratefully used with permission of photographer Vern Evans (www.vernevansphoto.com). Evans recounts that Zella made him wait a day for the photograph so that she would have time to don her finest dress and attend to her hair.

At the top of our pin is the Marine Corps unofficial slogan "Adapt, Improvise, and Overcome." "Through Innovation" noted at the bottom of the pin is appropriate since innovation led to adapting a wheelchair that improved the quality of life for Zella Brown and other patients. Zella Brown died at Carville in 1998. Our pin honors her as a person who overcame physical deformities with a spirit that will never die in the minds of those who knew and loved her.

Sinatra's song "All the Way" ends with "Who knows where the road will lead us Only a fool would say." Who can predict what 2021 holds for us, those we love, La Societé, La Femmes, and our country? But one thing is certain - we must strive to do our very best to make the most of every opportunity, faithfully serving and ever praying to our Supreme Commander for His help.
